# ACCESS TO JUSTICE IN ENVIRONMENTAL ADJUDICATION &

USING DOMESTIC LITIGATION TO LIMIT DANGEROUS CLIMATE CHANGE

Presented by the International Forum of Environmental Judges and the Centre for International Governance Innovation (CIGI)

On Tuesday, June 21, prior to the Wednesday official start of the IUCN AEL 2016 Colloquium in Oslo, you are cordially invited to a special day of debate and discussion on two pressing environmental law access to justice issues in environmental law, presented by the Centre for International Governance Innovation (CIGI)'s International Law Research Program (ILRP) and the International Forum for Environmental Judges.

#### Access to Justice in Environmental Adjudication

The day will begin at 10:00 with a forum on how environmental adjudicators ensure access to justice, while operating more efficiently in a climate of increasing legal and ecological complexity. There is much debate about the best form, constitution, powers and functions for environmental adjudicatory bodies and the *International Forum for Environmental Judges* will provide an opportunity to parse those ideas with senior members of the judiciary and academics from around the world. Chaired by His Honour Judge Laurie Newhook (Principal Judge of the New Zealand Environment Court), the keynote address 'Challenges Facing Environmental Adjudicators in the Next Decade' will be given by Emeritus Professor George 'Rock' Pring (University of Denver, USA). #### Using Domestic Litigation to Limit Dangerous Climate Change (free and open to all)

At 16:30, following the judges' forum, there will be a free, open to all, two-hour panel discussion on *Limiting dangerous climate change—The Emerging Importance of Domestic Courts and Human Rights Tribunals—Especially after Paris*, presented by CIGI's International Law Research Program. This panel will review why citizen initiated domestic climate litigation on three continents in 2015 was successful, and will examine the prospects for similar litigation in other jurisdictions. You will have a unique opportunity to hear from and discuss these issues with several key jurists involved in these cases, including Roger Cox, the Dutch Attorney and CIGI Senior Fellow who successfully argued the ground-breaking case for the Urgenda Foundation, and Pakistan Green Bench High Court Justice Hon. Syed Mansoor Ali Shah, who found that the Pakistan government had a constitutional duty to protect citizens from climate impacts and ordered the government to take concrete measures to do so.

We look forward to hopefully seeing you at what promises to be an enriching day of events.
